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I have always been acutely aware of my privilege of having had the opportunity to obtain such a high level of education as a young female. I acknowledge that had I been born in a different part of the world, this may not have been an attainable future for myself. As such, education equality has always been a cause near and dear to my heart.

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When a colleague introduced me to B1G1, this non-profit immediately spoke to me. B1G1 started with a simple idea: "What if every business could make a difference in their own way, just by doing what they normally do?" With more than a decade of work, this simple idea has now become a global movement.

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So when you book an appointment with me, 1 additional curriculum class will be provided to a girl in Cambodia.

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In Cambodia, school is technically free, but the school system only provides classes to cover half of the curriculum. If a student does not pay for additional curriculum classes to learn the other half of the curriculum, they are unlikely to pass the end of year exams. If they do not pass the exams than they cannot progress on to the next grade. Your support funds additional curriculum classes so that girls can learn what they need to learn, pass their exams, and progress to the next grade level.

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Did You Know?

Only 48.8% of 18 to 24 year olds in Cambodia complete grade nine. The International Labour Organization explains that getting girls into school, and keeping them there, is vital to reducing their vulnerability to trafficking. Yet there are many factors that can prevent a girl from accessing and completing school.
